Letter from the Executive Director

At a moment when misinformation about Muslims continues to shape far too much of our public conversation, ISPU remained focused in 2025 on what matters most: providing credible, trustworthy data that reflects reality and strengthens democratic values. Over the past year, ISPU deepened its impact across research, policy, and public engagement, and created opportunities to reach new audiences across faith groups, in Hollywood, and among community health leaders.

Throughout 2025, ISPU made a deliberate effort to take research beyond reports and into the places where it can drive real change. From dialogue workshops with interfaith partners in Albuquerque, to working groups of healthcare leaders in Dearborn, to training programs for Black Christian clergy in Chicago, our team brought data directly into conversation with the people shaping their communities. We also shared our findings through more than a dozen conference presentations and high-impact public events across the country, engaging policymakers, community leaders, journalists, advocates, and the broader public in turning evidence into action.

These efforts helped shape public dialogue on critical issues, including how Muslims voted in the 2024 election, their evolving policy priorities, and their enduring experiences with discrimination, among other issues. We did this while ensuring that American Muslim experiences were not just studied, but meaningfully shared, discussed, and used to advance equity and understanding nationwide.

Whether on Capitol Hill or in community clinics, in interfaith spaces or digital classrooms, ISPU continues to operate where research meets real-world impact. We are deeply grateful to our partners and donors, whose support makes it possible for us to produce and share this one-of-a-kind research, now and for years to come.



Advancing Equitable Healthcare in Michigan

APR

In April, we published a new report on health equity in Michigan's Muslim communities, providing foundational insights to support advocacy for accessible, equitable, and unbiased care among Arab and South Asian Muslims in Southeast Michigan. We shared the findings at an in-person event in Dearborn with local organizations and community leaders.

Muslims and Black Christians

JUL

In July, ISPU and the Muslim Wellness Foundation released a joint study exploring how Black Christians in the U.S. perceive and relate to American Muslims, particularly Black Muslims. Drawing on focus groups and interviews, the research examines the influence of media, church teachings, and personal experience on these perceptions.

Impact of Popular Media Portrayals

SEP

In September, we released *Stereotypes on Screen*, a first-of-its kind study examining how positive and negative portrayals of Muslims in entertainment television influence public attitudes and policy preferences, such as support for undemocratic policies and anti-Muslim legislation. This was followed by a webinar with Hollywood executives, producers, writers and actors.

Civic Engagement and Islamophobia

OCT

In October, we launched the seventh edition of our signature report, *American Muslim Poll 2025: Evolving Electorate, Enduring Challenges*, presenting new research on the experiences and views of U.S. Muslims at a critical moment. We unveiled the findings in Washington, D.C., with a panel moderated by Mehdi Hasan. The report is already shaping national conversations by challenging post-election assumptions, documenting persistent Islamophobia alongside community resilience, and highlighting the growing civic and political engagement of American Muslims nationwide.




* ISPU was awarded several multi-year grants to be expended in subsequent years. Following generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), the entire amount of the granted funds were recorded as income in previous years while the expenses were recorded throughout the life of the multi-year grants.
